REFUGEE RESETTLEMENT IN KING COUNTY

2,000

20-30

58%

- 2,000 refugees/year resettled in King County
- 5 resettlement agencies
- 1 Refugee Screening Clinic (RSC)
- Refugees screened within 90 days of arrival
- 20-30 miles between RSC and South King County
- 35 PCPs identified
 - 14 HealthPoint locations
 - 58% establish care at a HealthPoint clinic

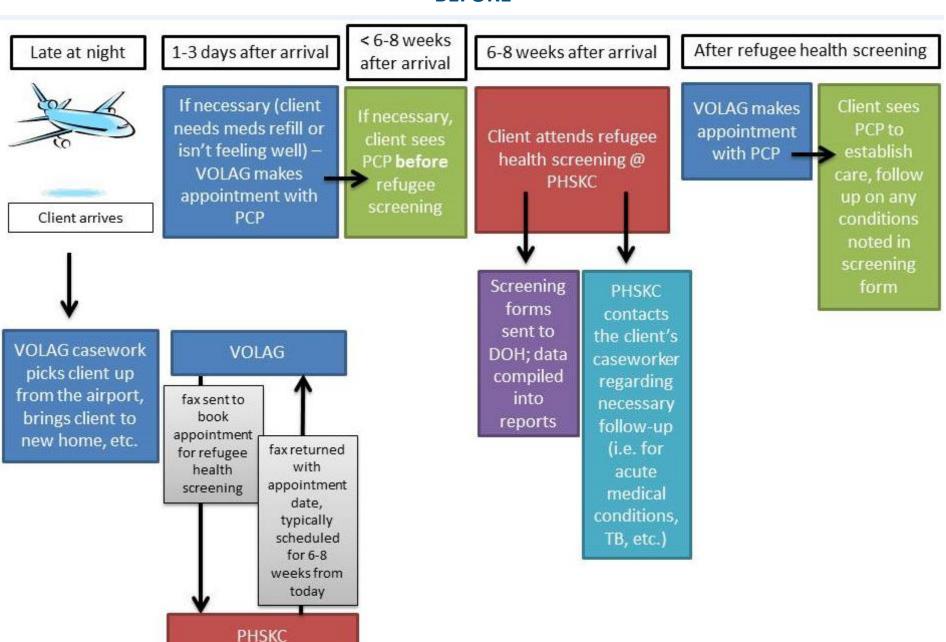

"Communication should occur directly between HealthPoint and PHSKC regarding newly arrived refugees who have appointments for primary care at HealthPoint"

Challenges of the Status Quo

- Large volume
- Risk of HIPAA violations
- PCP unknown
- Clients change PCP
- Missing results or information
- Lack of communication
- Duplication of tests and services
- Difficulty scheduling

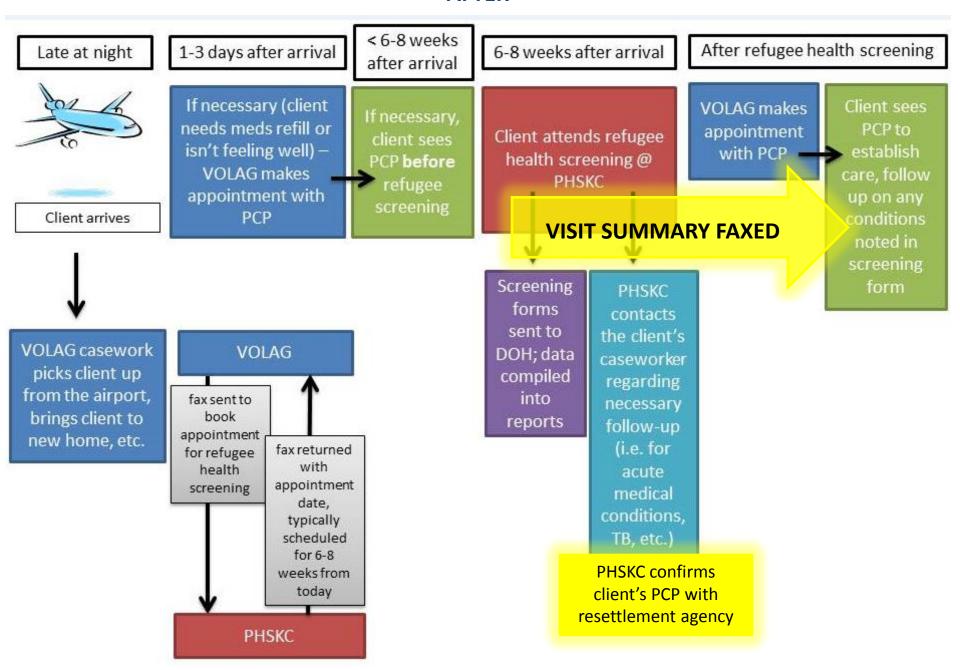
